In the last issue of *FoMRHIQ* I commented on David Z Crookes's translation of instrument descriptions in Praetorius's *Theatrum Instrumentorum*. On reflection, and after communication with the author, I have deemed my comments unfair as they did not objectively discuss the work in the manner they should have. The comments may have misled the reader into believing I was critiquing the translation of the work as a whole, which was not my intention. This was an error on my part, and I offer my most sincere apologies to Mr Crookes for any offence this may have caused.

For clarification, my intention was only to state that the translated descriptions of instruments are not always a direct (word for word) translation of Praetorius's work, and that it would be unfortunate if they were taken to be by those unfamiliar with, or unwilling to view the original 17th Century publication. That said the translations are wholly sympathetic to the original work, something which I previously failed to acknowledge.

Having discussed this matter with Mr Crookes, we have agreed to put it behind us in the spirit of complete friendship. I would like to thank David for his kind words of encouragement in regards to my work and for taking the time to speak with me.

Communications or 'Comms' as they are called, appeared unedited (please don't be libellous or insulting to other contributors!), so please send them EXACTLY as you wish them to appear – in 12 point type, on A4 paper with a 25mm or 1 inch border all round, or to put it another way, if you are using non-European paper sizes, then the text area must be 160 x 246 mm (or at least no wider or longer than this). Our printers make a good job of scanning photos.

In naming your Communication, remember that people will search for it online using keywords. So if you are discussing, say, a Ruckers harpsichord in Paris, call it 'Observations on a Ruckers harpsichord in Paris', rather than 'Observations on a curious old instrument.'

You can send contributions EITHER on paper, OR as a Word-compatible or PDF attachment. If you *really* do not have access to a word processor of any kind, we may be able to retype typed or handwritten submissions. The address to send them to is:
